

HARVARD COACHES MAKE LINE CHANGE

**Replace Chase With Gamache
at End to Gain Strength
on Defense.**

STAFFORD AT QUARTERBACK

Is Almost Certain to Start Against

Princeton Saturday, Taking

Place of Check.

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Nov. 4.—There was a significant change made in the lineup of the Harvard varsity eleven this afternoon. This was the placing of Ernie Gamache at end in place of Phil Chase. Gamache started against Boston University, but Chase was at end yesterday.

The coaches have been very much impressed with Gamache's speed down the field, his tackling and his rare ability to sense the opponent's plays. He has not had much experience, but his natural ability has helped him a lot. When he was at centre he was faster than the ends and was a surer tackler. Besides, he is the type of end Harvard needs in interference for running plays.

Jake Stafford continued at quarter and as Check again remained on the sidelines, the choice of Stafford as Harvard's general for the Princeton game seems certain. Phil Theopold also was at left guard again and is likely to remain there. The drill today was entirely on straight football, there being no forward passing at all. Much time was taken in placing the backs and linemen on the interference assignments on the routine of plays which are being worked out for the Princeton game.

Joe McGlone ran the first team of substitutes this afternoon, Spalding not being on the field. Chase played on the substitutes' line while Hoague was at guard with Holder at centre. The team as it will begin Saturday's game will average about 186 pounds, the back field average and the line average being approximately the same.

Tomorrow night there will be a mass meeting for the students at the Harvard Union and at the meeting the team will be on the platform and coaches Fisher and Withington probably will be the speakers. There has been little or no betting on the game, but Harvard, hereabouts at least, is a 10 to 9 favorite.

FORDHAM TEAM GETS ANOTHER DAY'S REST

**Gargan Will Start Drive Today
for Western Maryland Game—
To Scrimmage Tomorrow.**

Another day of rest for the Fordham University football squad was ordered by Head Coach Frank Gargan yesterday. This is the first time that the Maroon players, who scored a decisive victory over the New York University eleven at the Yankee Stadium last Saturday, have enjoyed two days of rest in succession this season, but Gargan feels that his men are in splendid condition and that the lay-off will prove beneficial.

The Fordham squad will spring back into action again this afternoon. A long but light workout, consisting of a blackboard talk, a session in fundamentals and a signal drill, is planned by Gargan for today. A long scrimmage will be held tomorrow in preparation for the game with Western Maryland, to be played at Fordham Field on Saturday. This will be the only hard workout of the present week.

According to Trainer Jake Weber, all of the regular players will be in good condition by Saturday. It is doubtful, however, whether Paul Brennan, captain and star centre, and Joe Manning, star back, will play. Although both men will be ready to get into action if needed, Gargan will probably decide to save them for the more important games that are to follow.

The coaches have expressed themselves as more than pleased with the defensive work of the team and the interference furnished by the line on the attack. The line has shown itself capable of repelling most attempts at advancing through or around it and the secondary defense has been successful in breaking up the forward pass attack of the opposing teams.

During the remaining days of the present week the Fordham coaches intend to devote much of their efforts to the development of the long forward passing game. Although the Maroon's aerial attack netted it two touchdowns in the game with N. Y. U., the forward pass did not come up to the standard of the team's other methods of attack. From midfield last Saturday Fordham was unable to employ the overhead game with any marked degree of success.

It is likely that Coach Gargan's team will use the forward pass attack to a considerable extent in the game with Western Maryland on Saturday. The Maroon mentor hopes to have this style of attack developed to a high degree for the games with Catholic University and Georgetown later in the season. The contest with Catholic University will be played at Fordham Field on Nov. 22, while that with Georgetown will be staged at the Polo Grounds a week later. This will be the final game to be played at the home of the Giants this year. In the meantime, in addition to meeting Western Maryland on Saturday, the Maroon eleven will clash with the C. C. N. Y. team a week from Saturday.

NOTRE DAME WORKING HARD

**South Bend Team Drilling for Ne-
braska and Wisconsin Games.**

With three victories recorded in the last three big games, Notre Dame will center on the next two, the first against Wisconsin on Saturday at Madison, Wis., and the second against Nebraska at South Bend, Ind., one week from Saturday. Notre Dame is not under-rating Wisconsin, but it is known that Coach Rockne will point his team for the Nebraska game. The Cornhuskers have won the last two games from Notre Dame, and last year especially did the unexpected when they defeated Notre Dame after Rockne's men had conquered Princeton and the Army.

Adam Walsh, the captain, who was injured so badly in the Army game that he has been out of action since, is expected to play part of the game against Wisconsin, but he will be saved for the clash with Nebraska. Stuhldreher, quarterback, who was hurt in the last three minutes of play against Princeton, will not be used before the Nebraska game. Rockne, it was said by a friend of his here yesterday, realizes that all the prestige gained in Notre Dame's sensational performances in the East, can be lessened through another reverse at the hands of Nebraska, inasmuch as Illinois already has registered a triumph over the Cornhuskers.

It now looks almost certain that Notre Dame will face two Eastern opponents again next year, with the Army as a fixture and with the University of Pennsylvania game almost clinched. Notre Dame would prove a popular attraction with Penn as it has a big following in Philadelphia. The fact that the Penn officials may agree to the home-and-home arrangement is the one factor that may go a long way toward clinching a two-year agreement between Penn and Notre Dame.
