The weather was so warm and so much hard work already has been done that the workout, although continuously active, was not very hard.

The chief interest today was the permanent placing of Leo Daley, last year's best guard, on the right side of the Crimson rush line. Daley is now fully eligible to play and so far his knee has shown no signs of being weakened by last year's accident.

Ernest Gamache, who has been one of the substitute centres is now being

He played on a wing during part of the last season and many were surprised when he was not considered for the position when the Harvard squad reported this Fall. Gamache is a player who seems able to keep in the game without injuries. There is no question of Harvard being weak at end this Fall.
