Keeseville Horse Show Set for Sun.

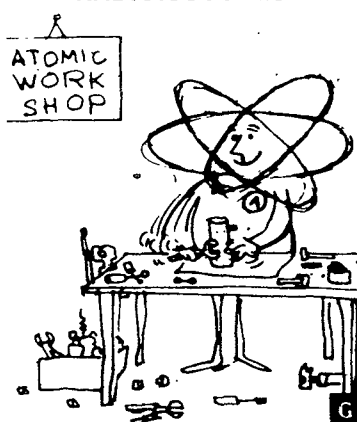
On Sunday, September 18, the Keeseville Riding and Driving Club will be holding its yearly day of fun for horse enthusiasts.

Albert Perryea Awarded Medal

Specialist 6 Albert E. Perryea, U. S. Army, recently received the Army Commendation Medal for exemplary service as translator-interpreter in the Democratic Republic of the Congo, prior to his present assignment in Vietnam. He was raised in Champlain by his guardians, Mr. and Mrs. Homer E. Gamache.

During the period February-August 1965, Specialist Perryea distinguished himself through extraordinary work as a member of a Special Forces Mobile Training Team on an advisory mission to the Congo. He succeeded in establishing an effective liaison between French-speaking Belgian and Congolese officials, and civilian government, United Nations and International Red Cross personnel.

Impressed by his efficiency and talent as an interpreter and his ability to handle protocol matters, the Chief of Staff of the Congolese National Army requested Specialist Perryea's indefinite retention in service at his post in Stanleyville.

Specialist Perryea also greatly

contributed to the improvement of logistical procurement procedures for a Congolese National Army Brigade. During off-duty hours, and of his own volition, he conducted English language classes for Congolese military personnel. Specialist Perryea attended St. Mary's Academy in Champlain and completed high school after his entry into the U. S. Army in 1954. He took basic training at Ft. Custer, Mich. and then embarked on his career as an intelligence-language specialist.

Mrs. Walker Hosts Party

Mrs. Jesse Walker was hostess for a Stanley Brush party Saturday morning at the riverside of her home for the benefit of the ship HOPE.

The HOPE spent last year reaching the people of Nicaragua, Viet Nam, among the many countries it reaches each year. In June of this year the HOPE had 119 American doctors on board and many dedicated nurses. Last year the Champlain Home Demonstration Unit held a Tea for the benefit of the HOPE.
