

VISITING JOURNALISTS VIEW OLYMPIC SITE

Gamache Directs Nine European Newspaper Men on Inspection Tour at Lake Placid.

An inspection tour of the layout at Lake Placid on which the Winter Olympics will be held in 1932 was made recently by nine foreign newspaper men under the guidance of Ernest F. Gamache, general secretary of the Olympic Winter games committee. The party was made up of Georges Kirkoff of Bulgaria, Jaroslav Koudelka, Czechoslovakia; Erick Moller, Denmark; George Meri, Estonia; Urho Toivola, Finland; Ernst Feder, Germany; T. Cnossen, Holland; S. Konstad, Norway, and S. Backlund, Sweden.

They were taken through the new \$100,000 Olympic Stadium now under construction near the center of Lake Placid, the Intervales ski jump, which was completed two years ago and is rated one of the finest in the world, and Mount von Hoevenberg, the site of the bob-run. The run will wind down the mountain side in twenty curves through picturesque scenery.

The guests expressed the belief that the Winter sports in 1932 would prove highly successful because of the natural facilities present at the resort and the efforts being made by the various arrangements committees.

After the inspection trip the visiting journalists were entertained at a banquet at which Godfrey Dewey, executive vice president of Lake Placid Club and president of the Winter games committee, spoke.

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
