WILLIAM R. CARVER
William Reuben Carver, a prominent resident of Westford, and for the past four years a member of the executive staff of the Massachusetts State hospital and infirmary of Tewksbury, died there yesterday after several weeks' illness.
He was the son of the late John C. and Mary (Kittredge) Carver and was born in the old homestead, Depot street, Westford, then owned by his grandfather, William Kittredge.
He was educated in Westford schools, entering Westford academy in 1887 and later attended Burdett's college, Boston. For several years he was associated with George A. Brigham Co. of Charlestown and was later president of the Hutchinson Land Co. He served on the executive staff at the Tewksbury institution until forced to retire by ill health.
Mr. Carver was one of the large property owners in Westford and was engaged in extensive orcharding for many years. E., and the Spaulding Light Cavalry association of Westford.
