Jap Post-Surrender Attack On Third Fleet Frustrated

600 Kamikaze Pilots Talked Out Of Making Mass Suicide Assault

TOKYO, Jan. 17 (INS)—How 600 Kamikaze pilots were dissuaded from a post-surrender mass suicide attack on the US Third fleet was disclosed today by the Christian leader of Japan. He is Dr. Toyohiko Kagawa, who created Yoshio Kodama, a war crimes suspect, with avowing the treacherous attack during the week following Japan's surrender. Kodama, described by Japanese Leutists as the "Young Hitler of Japan," is now held in Sugamo prison, awaiting trial as a war criminal. He made millions of yen while serving as purchasing agent for the Japanese Navy during the war. He and Kagawa were appointed special advisers to former Premier Hiroshi Kuroi shortly after the signing of the imperial rescript ending Japan's dream of world domination. Hurried Trips. The Nipponese Christian leader disclosed today that Kodama had made hurried trips to Japanese embassies, where he exhorted Kodama pilots to remain calm in the face of defeat. Kodama found 600 navy pilots ignorant of what they considered

betrayal of their cause, preparing for a mass suicide attack on warships of William F. (Bull) Halsey's Third fleet. The Japanese Christian leader said that the pilots were dissuaded by the impassioned entreaties of Kodama, who convinced them that they would be doing Japan "a great disservice."

Kagawa said that Kodama, "by the single action, perhaps, atones for any evil he may have done."
