Humid Heat Linked to Nine Deaths

BOSTON, July 19 (UP)—Nine persons perished in New England during the week-end as result of heart seizures, drowning and an automobile accident while humid heat blanketed the region.

All of the victims were attempting to escape the heat that climbed to 90 degrees in Boston yesterday and 92 degrees in scattered spots including Westfield, Mass., and Newport, Vt.

Eastport, Me., easternmost city in the United States, was a strangely cool community thanks to intermittent sea breezes. The temperature there lingered near 62 degrees while villages only 20 miles away sweltered in 90 degree heat.

Beaches Jammed

Beaches and highways were jammed by heat fugitives.

Victims of heart seizures induced by the rising temperatures were Walter M. Shallow, 40, of Cambridge; James A. Sacco, 44, of Medford; Joseph A. Fulton, 75, of Revere, and 13-year-old Edmund Tavares of Bristol, R. I.

Drowning fatalities included George Koulouritis, 18, of Roxbury; and two New Hampshire men—Richard Duval, 22, of Littleton and nine-year-old Paul Paris of Manchester.

U. S. Troops in Japan Trained for Mass Transportation by Aircraft

Four Divisions Readied for Fast Moves; Soldiers in U. S. to Get Similar Drilling

TOKIO, July 19 (AP)—Maj. Gen. James A. Lester, chief of staff of the U. S. Eighth Army, said today intensive training is under way in northern Japan for the mass transportation of that Army's four divisions by air.

Key men of the four divisions, he said, have been instructed in the essentials of airborne transportation. Upon their return to tactical units throughout the United States they will become the nucleus for further training of combat forces in the principals of aerial movement of infantrymen. One division has established its own school and others are planned.

The purpose of the training is to prepare the officers and men of the Eighth Army to be ready to move anywhere by aerial transport.
