BANK OFFICERS ARE CONVICTED

Three Found Guilty of Misapplying Funds of Closed Bank of U. S.

New York County Jury Reaches Verdict After 14 Hours of Deliberation

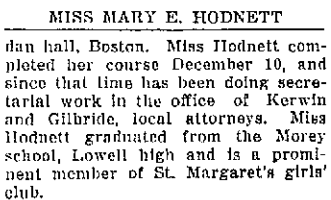
NEW YORK, June 20 (AP)—Three of the four officials of the closed banks of United States, on trial for 12 weeks on charges of misapplying funds, were convicted today by a county jury.

The trial culminated five months of investigation by state and county authorities into the largest bank closing in the history of the United States.

Judge Donnellan said he would pass sentence Tuesday. The maximum penalty is seven years imprisonment or a fine of \$10,000 or both.

Battered Nautilus Unable to Proceed

WASHINGTON, June 20. (AP)—The battered polar submarine Nautilus has not yet seen the end of even her immediate difficulties.

First dead engines forced her commander, Sir Hubert Wilkins, to call for aid. The battleship Wyoming took the undersea craft in tow, and more trouble followed. The Wyoming informed the navy last night that heavy seas had stopped both vessels about 240 miles from Queenstown, Ireland, where the damage is to be repaired.

The Nautilus stopped since noon. Battered down. Not communicating. Saving battery. Trouble with fuel oil and air compressors. Starboard engine, port motor and periscope damaged beyond ship repair.
