

CLUB WANTS MORE ROOM FIRST ANNUAL DANCE

C. M. A. C. Has Outgrown
Present Quarters — May
Erect New Building

Federation of B. & M. Car
Shops Have Jolly Time at
Associate Hall

The C.M.A.C. has outgrown its present quarters in Pawtucket street, a fact explained by the building committee. The building committee, which is composed of the following members, was appointed at a recent meeting of the association to look into the advisability of either building another story to the present structure, or to select a new site for the construction of a new clubhouse. Arthur L. Bho, chairman; Albert Bergeron, secretary; Joseph A. Legare, Dr. George O. Lavallee, Joseph A. Desrosiers and J. N. Chretien. The committee looked over several sites, talked with architects and contractors in relation to the erection of another story to the present building and last evening, through its chairman, made its report.

In the course of his report Chairman Bho reviewed at length the expense involved in the raising of the building another story and informed the members that under no consideration would the looks and Canals Co. sell the strip of land extending in the rear of the building to the canal bank, so that all thoughts of building an ell must be forgotten. He told of several sites visited by the committee and said there was one short distance from present quarters, which seems most desirable. This piece of property consists of a fine building and a large tract of land and he said the committee will be held in session next week to consider the matter. He further stated, however, that the committee did not wish to recommend anything, for its members thought it more advisable to leave the entire matter to the society members.

At the close of the chairman's report the committee was extended a vote of thanks for its work and President Chretien announced that the question will be brought up at a special meeting to be held in the near future.

The C.M.A.C. was founded February 7, 1875 under the name of L'Association Catholique des Jeunes Gens de Lowell. Since that time the late Rev. J. A. Fournier, O.M.I., who passed away in 1904, and a few years later its name was changed to Corporation des Membres de l'Association Catholique (C.M.A.C.). The present building in Pawtucket street, built in 1890 and at that time it served the purpose well, but during the past few years the membership roll has increased to such an extent that the building has become inadequate for such a large membership.

The building is a two-and-a-half frame building with large basement in which bowling alleys are a full equipped gymnasium, and a billiard room. On the second floor of the building are several small offices, a large reception parlor and recreation room in which are pool and billiard tables. The second floor is taken up with a large assembly hall.

Some of the members feel that the roof of the building could be squared off and the attic finished, and that part of the building could then be utilized as an assembly hall, where the tables and other amusements could be transferred to the second floor. The street floor could then be converted into offices and other rooms which are deemed necessary for the welfare of the organization. Others, however, feel that even with the changes proposed, the building would not be large enough to accommodate the large membership and they also feel that a new site and new building are imperative.

The matter will be finally decided shortly and it is voted to purchase a new site and erect a new building, negotiations will be immediately started and it is expected the construction of the new building will be under way before the weather sets in.

The present building and land of the C.M.A.C. are free of debt.

LOWELL DISTRICT COURT

Alleged Moonshine Dealers
Fined \$350—Drunkenness
and Non-Support Cases

Four moonshine cases, with fines assessed in three and a continuance granted in the fourth, augmented the sum realized to date under the liquor enforcement laws by \$350, when the defendants appeared before Judge Thomas J. Knight in district court today.

The largest single fine was paid by Thure Cote, from whom, it is charged, the liquor was sold yesterday in making a purchase of wine yesterday. This purchase was made, according to the officers, in a near-beer saloon on Moody street. A fine of \$150 was imposed.

John F. Hennessey, charged with making an illegal sale to an agent of the department at a near-beer establishment at the corner of Lakeview avenue and Allen street, was continued until May 13.

Another illegal sale, made to a liquor agent, was charged against George Latrou in a tenement on Lagrange street. On a plea of guilty, Latrou was allowed to pay a fine of \$100. It is said that 6 gallons of wine were cleverly concealed under a bed.

Stanley Kallez was arrested the other day for illegal keeping, as a result of a raid on his premises at 51 Front street. After securing a warrant for Kallez's arrest it was found that he had purchased wine and had consorted with the city. Recently he departed with a Boston lawyer relative to the case, and the Boston man delegated the defense to a local colleague. In court today Kallez paid a fine of \$100.

The officer making the arrests for illegal sale were Sergeant Michael H. Winn, and Officers Adolphe Cossette, John F. Lynch and Frank Moloney.

Peter Scott, who appeared for drunkenness and was dismissed on Monday, reappeared on the same charge yesterday and stated that he had lost \$128 which he had on his person the previous day, causing Judge Knight to comment on the fact that the case should be investigated and to grant a continuance until today. He was given a two months' suspended sentence to the house of correction this morning. An investigation of his case is under way.

The case of Peter Wasyluk, for drunkenness and non-support, charged with violation of the motor vehicle law, was dismissed.
