### George Wallace hospitalized

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP) - Gov. George C. Wallace's doctors began giving him antibiotics intravenously Monday for a urinary tract infection and declined to speculate when he might be released from the hospital.

Billy Joe Camp, the governor's press secretary, said an evaluation of weekend tests at University Hospital showed Wallace's infection was of "a serious nature ... but very treatable."

He said the governor's physician, Dr. Alan Stamm, determined that the infection would respond best to antibiotics given intravenously, or direct into the veins, rather than orally.

He said Stamm described Wallace's progress Monday as "very satisfactory" but the doctor was "very reluctant to pin a timetable down" on Wallace's recovery and release from the hospital.

Wallace, who was elected to a record fourth term as governor in 1963, entered the hospital Thursday after running a fever of 101 to 102 degrees. Camp said the fever was brought under control with Tylenol.

Wallace, 66, has been paralyzed from the waist down since he was shot by a would-be assassin in 1972. Ailments associated with his paralysis sent him to the hospital three times last year for 86 days.

### Double slaying stuns students

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) - Every homicide detective in the city has been assigned to the case of two 17-year-old boys - described as "always laughing" when together - who were found slain in a downtown vacant lot, both shot in the head.

Scott Christopher Nelson and Richard David Stephenson were last seen driving to a high school football game Saturday night.

The boys were shot in the head at close range, Jefferson County Deputy Coroner Carl Adams said. Their bodies were found early Sunday in an empty lot near the car in which they'd been riding.

Police interviewed relatives and friends of the Trinity High School juniors to try to reconstruct their actions Saturday night.

Trinity sophomore Rob Grissom said he had planned to go with the boys but had to back out because he didn't have any money.

Donnie Gardner, a classmate of the two victims, described them as "quiet types who didn't cause any trouble. They didn't have any enemies."

"When they were together, they were always laughing," said Kim Crawford, who had dated Richard over the summer. She said Scott and his family had gone to Florida for part of the summer, and that she could tell Richard was glad when Scott returned.

Mullen, who also teaches religion at the all-boys' Catholic school, described the boys as "serious students."

Richard had been on the honor roll every grading period except one since he arrived at Trinity, said Mark Sells, the school's community relations director. He said Scott was a solid "B" student.

### Three teens kill homosexual

BANGOR, Maine (AP) - Three teen-agers accused of killing a homosexual by throwing him over

a bridge into Kenduskeag Stream pleaded guilty to manslaughter Monday, in a proceeding that drew protests from gay rights activists.

James Baines, 15, Shawn I. Mabry, 16, and Daniel Ness, 17, all of Bangor, entered their pleas of admission - the equivalent of guilty pleas in adult cases - at a juvenile hearing before District Court Judge David Cox.

The hearing took place less than three weeks after Cox had rejected a prosecution motion that sought to have the defendants bound over to Superior Court for trial as adults.

As juveniles, Baines, Mabry and Ness face a maximum punishment of confinement to the Maine Youth Center until they turn 21. Had they been tried as adults and found guilty of murder, they would have faced a minimum of 25 years in prison.

Cox continued the case to Friday for sentencing and allowed the three to remain free in their parents' custody.

Wearing lavender ribbons as a sign of solidarity, members of Bangor's Gay-Straight Coalition expressed anger at the manslaughter pleas as they left the courtroom.

"With liberty and justice for all' has become an American farce," said coalition spokesman Duncan Langille. "I'm fed up. I'm scared and I'm really angry. If the government of my own city, state and country isn't going to protect me, I ... will start doing it myself."

In statements to police, the defendants claimed that they had meant only to scare Howard because of a sexual advance he allegedly made to one of the youths a few weeks earlier.

### Crew error caused B-1 crash

EDWARDS AIR FORCE BASE, Calif. (AP) - A prototype B-1 bomber crashed because the crew failed to shift fuel inside the tanks as they moved the wings forward, putting the craft out of balance and pitching its nose up in a stall, an Air Force official said Monday.

"It was human error. They did not shift the center of gravity," Brig. Gen. John Schoepner, president of the accident investigation board, said of the Aug. 29 crash in the Mojave Desert.

Civilian co-pilot T.D. "Doug" Benefield was killed and two crew members were injured.

The general said the injured pilot, Air Force Maj. Richard V. Reynolds, told investigators he does not recall seeing warning lights flash to indicate that the fuel had not been shifted from one tank to another. However, two master control warning lights and a center of gravity warning light did function, he said.

The nose of the swing-wing, four-engine bomber started to pitch up when the plane was 4,200 feet above the ground after finishing two "minimum control speed tests," and during preparations for a third, he said.

The plane's wings can be swept back into a streamlined delta for high-speed flight, or extended forward, perpendicular to the fuselage, for maximum lift.

The automatic system that normally transfers fuel among the B-1's tanks was disengaged because the test called for manual control. Schoepner said the crew was responsible for turning a knob to transfer the fuel manually, and that Benefield was the one specifically charged with turning the knob.

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
