Missouri Corn

Jefferson City, Mo., Nov. 1.—The 1932 Missouri corn crop is now indicated 189,240,000 bush-els from 6,308,000 acres, averag-ing 30 bushels, as compared a-against last year's 174,734,000 bushels from 6,131,000 acres, averaging 28.5 bushels, accord-ing to E A Logan of the United States Department of Agriculture and Jewell Mayes of the State Board of Agriculture, the joint announcement showing that corn gathering began more than ten days earlier than usual.

Franklin county has 40,140 acres averaging 33 bushels. Crawford county has 20,600 acres averaging 26 bushels. Washing-ton county has 16,630 acres, averag-ing 24 bushels.

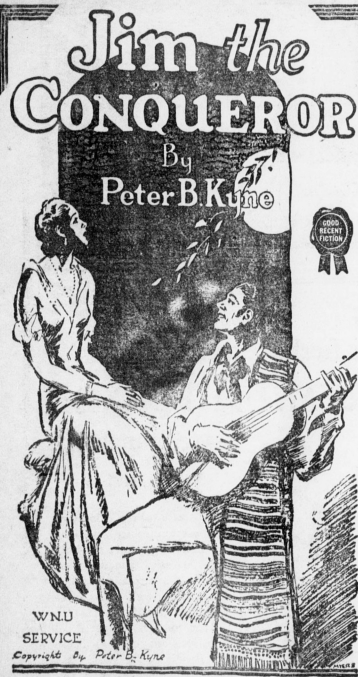
